Some results of your involvement

What are the motivation levels of pupils in reading, writing and mathematics at the beginning of elementary school? Frédéric Guay and Denis Talbot answer this and many other questions in the brand-new fascicle entitled Motivation in the First and Second Grades of Elementary School: An Analysis Based on Gender and Socioeconomic Status. We learn that in the first and second grades, pupils derive more pleasure from reading and writing than from mathematics. Also boys are more motivated than girls in mathematics, while girls are more interested in reading and writing than boys.

Having a good sleep is important!

The September harvest was bountiful – another fascicle was published, this one entitled Sleep: An Unknown Actor in Child Development. Dominique Petit, Jean Paquet, Évelyne Touchette and Jacques Y. Montplaisir describe the sleep profiles of children and the impact sleep problems have on their development in early elementary school. We learn, for example, that at 8 years of age, nearly 25% of children sleep fewer than the number of recommended hours a night, which is 10. The research in this fascicle is extremely useful in advancing our knowledge of sleep in children. Again, this research saw the light of day because of the data you and your child and all participating parents and children have been providing us with over the years.
