Recent publications based on data from the "I am, I'll be" survey

Cognitive, behavioural and motor skills of children in kindergarten as predictors of success in Grade 4

The fascicle entitled "Predicting Academic Achievement in Fourth Grade from Kindergarten Cognitive, Behavioural and Motor Skills" has shed light on some fascinating associations:

- "Number knowledge and receptive vocabulary in kindergarten were associated with academic performance in all subjects in Grade 4."
- "Fine motor skills in kindergarten were associated with future academic performance in writing and reading."
- "Certain cognitive and behavioural skills in kindergarten can not only predict academic performance as such, but also classroom and school engagement."

"School engagement" means the importance a child ascribes to school. "Classroom engagement" means respect for rules, retention, etc.

Learning more about victimization

In the fascicle entitled "Peer Victimization from Kindergarten to Grade 2," we read that:

"More than a quarter of children reported having often been victims of behaviours such as being called names or being physically intimidated. Though some of these behaviours seemed to decrease as age and grade level increased, it remains that a certain number of children were targets of many of these behaviours in an ongoing fashion."
